A Message from the Governor

Hi District 8 Toastmasters!

Are you interested in a district leader position for the 2015 – 2016 Toastmasters year? Would you like to be considered for District Director, Program Quality Director, Club Growth Director, Division Director, Area Director, Public Relations Manager, Administration Manager, or Finance Manager? If these positions do not sound familiar to you, it's because they are new district leader titles.

DIST. COATRASTER

At its February 2014 meeting, the Board of Directors decided on new district leader titles that will take effect on July 1, 2015 when the incoming district leaders assume their new leadership roles. They will be the first generation of leaders to carry the new and contemporary district leader titles.

The decision to modernize the district leader titles was based on the findings of a Board of Directors committee studying the competencies required for district leaders to successfully fulfill their roles. As a result of this study, it became clear that titles needed to evolve to better reflect their responsibilities and real-world practice. The new titles:

Are more modern.

Accurately reflect the focus and responsibility of each role.

Are more familiar to potential members.

Create a parallel between district leadership in the corporate and volunteer sectors.

Reflect the level of leadership required in each position.

Toastmasters International believes this change is a positive step for Toastmasters International and is in alignment with the organization's strategic plan objective to modernize the programs with a renewed focus on leadership.

The District Nominations Schedule from Toastmasters International provides a schedule to facilitate the district nomination process. During the month of December, a call for candidates is to be published on our district website and/ or in the district newsletter. This is the call for candidates. Leadership position descriptions, including the competencies and responsibilities for each and a copy of the District Leader Nominating Form should be included. The District Leader Nominating Form is already posted on the District Website - http://www.dist8tm.org/docs/District%20Leader%20Nomination%20Form.pdf. Directions state to mail, fax or email to your district governor. I request that you submit it to Lora Mather, Nominating Committee Chair at lorections state to mail, fax or email to your district governor. Directions state to mail, fax or email to your district governor. I request that you submit it to Lora Mather, Nominating Committee Chair at lorections to district websites. Submit the form by March 1, 2015.

For the positions to be voted upon at the spring conference, here are the leadership positions and descriptions including competencies and responsibilities as found in the Rev. 2/2014 District Leadership Manual.

District Director (District Governor)

As the District Director, you are responsible for directly overseeing and managing the district's day-to-day operations, finances, and human resources. You must empower your district leadership team to work together toward the district mission, while supporting each other in his or her development as a leader. Together with your district leadership team,

Inspire & Motivate with Genuine Humility of a Leader!

From time to time each one of us should stop and ponder, what does it mean to be a leader? In our ever changing world, the only constant is "change" itself. Leaders, especially good leaders need to recognize new ways to survive and thrive, particularly in an organization comprised of volunteers. Organizations like Toastmasters are filled with adults on their own self-development paths. These volunteers seeking to improve their leadership skills have good intentions and desire to lead positively which should be kept in mind. We are practicing to be better leaders.

In Leadership for the Twenty-First Century Joseph Rost said leaders who exercise their leadership in an authoritarian manner rapidly outdate themselves and hamper the development of their fellow members. Contrast that authoritarian style with Heifetz's The Practice of Adaptive Leadership which offers useful tools for leaders to thrive in this changing world. Heifetz recommends we reflect and look at situations from a higher distance. A detached distance perspective helps create a process of humility to build creative thinking skills. This then allows self-development and stimulates understanding of situations and the people around them. The emphasis is on internal and external self-awareness and leadership development to become a "real leader" as opposed to the "counterfeit leader." Dean Williams explains in Real Leadership a counterfeit leader spends their time in political maneuvers protecting their territory and promoting their self-interests rather than working for the good of those they are to lead.

When I think of a recent good example of a "real leader" Captain Sullenberger comes to mind. It was not a matter of pure luck that he was able to land his Airbus smoothly on the Hudson River. He prepared for the worst case scenarios, he practiced in simulators, he knew his plane and his crew. Captain Sullenberger was knowledgeable, flexible and adaptive as a result he mobilized his team and kept them working together in a very turbulent time as a leader and everyone survived. The best positive outcomes are achieved through strong, authentic leaders who inspire and motivate with humility. As we practice our leadership skills as well as our speaking skills, we should remember to practice with humility.

Early Bird Officers Training (EBOT): District 8 officers, once again proved they are dedicated toward their self-development in leadership and to helping their club earn their DCP goals. On Saturday, December 13, 2014, 81 officers attended the Early Bird Officers training opportunity at the County Library. This was one of the largest attendance recorded for an EBOT. Members were in great spirits and learned from the experiences of trainers and fellow officers. Melissa Kelly presented on "creating the best club climate" drawing from the success of her "Monsanto Noon Time Club." Team members making this training possible included Chris Rigdon, Carol Breckner, Elizabeth Link, Tom Gillard, Yolandea Wood, Carol Steinbach, Rob Van Winkle, Phil Stephenson and Tom Coscia. The Theory of One STAR

"All for one and one for all" is the mantra approaching the second half of the Toastmasters year! Are you onboard? Can District-8 count on you?

Success for District-8 is measured by its number of paid clubs, paid memberships, and distinguished clubs. What drives these numbers, YOU.

The September issue of the Communic~8 outlined truths about the district: challenges faced and offered solutions in membership growth, maintaining charter strength, and participation in the distinguished club plan (DCP). Tables were provided, so that you could see where the district as a whole needed to be to reach its goals according to the criteria set by Toastmasters International.

The table below shows where the district is today and where the district needs to be to achieve distinguished status. (The September article reflects select and president's distinguished numbers.)

Goal	To Date	Year's Goal	Needed
Paid Clubs	103	111	8
Membership Payments	2052	4615	2576
Distinguished Clubs	0	43	43

Note: "Paid clubs" today can still be lost if not paid in April.

While distinguished club numbers will be reflected at the end of the Toastmasters' year, it is important for your club to have a DCP in place. This will allow you to successfully monitor your progress and make adjustments as necessary to accomplish your club's goals. For example, at the start of the Toastmasters' year, your club identified, by name, individuals who were going to achieve the educational goals. These individuals committed to doing so and one individual slated for a competent communication (CC) award moved out of state. What do you do? Just as in football, you bring in your second string quarterback, your backup Toastmaster. If everyone is on "ready alert," it means that all members are engaged and prepared to step

in for the good of the club, which will impact the area, the division, and the district.

Achieving the educational awards is one piece of the DCP, membership is another. Clubs are tasked with doing two things: retain current membership



and increase membership. Membership retention is easy to accomplish provided members are engaged and the Toastmaster value is realized. It is up to the club's leadership to know the pulse of the club and its members.

Attracting new members can be challenging, which is why clubs were asked to schedule an open house around Toastmasters International membership building contests:

- Smedley Award (August 1 to September 30)
- Talk Up Toastmasters! (February 1 to March 31)
- Beat the Clock! (May 1 to June 30)

By doing so, members are more apt to invite people to an orchestrated event and the club maximizes its chances to grow its membership. Start planning your next open house now!

Toastmasters, you play a vital role in the district's success: Pay your club dues before the end of March, 2015. Officers, make sure your club's DCP plan is up-to-date. Members BE A STAR...If each member will STrive and complete one educational goal, Achieve a leadership goal, and Recruit and retain a member, the district will meet its goals. Look for more information about this initiative in the coming weeks. 

IPDG Reflects on International Convention

"My fear of flying starts as soon as I buckle myself in and then the guy up front mumbles a few unintelligible words then before I know it I'm thrust into the back of my seat by acceleration that seems way too fast and the rest of the trip is an endless nightmare of turbulence, of near misses. And then the cabbie drops me off at the airport." -- Dennis Miller

This was exactly how I felt in the months before our trip to attend the Toastmaster International Convention in Kuala Lumpur Malaysia. In mid-May, David Kincade and I reached our "point of no return" purchasing our airline tickets. With the reality of the Malaysian airliners disasters and with each expression of concern for my safety from my Toastmaster friends, my fear rose. Fear was not the only emotion I



Frustration was my first emotion. Our flight was delayed due to a thunderstorm in Dallas. American Airlines rerouted us to the east through Charlotte, NC and then on to Frankfurt, Germany to board a Malaysian flight across Europe and the Middle East. Yes, this 23 hour flight was a long period of boredom with sporadic sudden jolts of intense fear.

Upon our landing at Kuala Lumpur International Airport, fear, frustration and boredom were replaced by awe at the beauty of the palm plantations surrounding Kuala Lumpur. Palm oil is the number one export. Driving closer to the Petronas Towers, I felt excitement seeing a growing modern urban city of over 20 million residents.

After we checked into our hotel, I wanted to stay awake, but jet lag called my name leading me to our hotel bed for a mid day nap. However, I was not to stay in bed for long; our luggage did not arrive with us. We were told that our bags were sightseeing in London and would arrive in a few days. Thus, our first task was shopping. David and I visited the Suria Mall at the base of the PETRONAS Towers. We were on a mission to find plus sizes in a petite world. In this predominantly Muslin world, female clothing choices were limited to long sleeve blouses, long skirts and head scarves. When David and I asked, we were pointed toward the equivalent of JC Penney's and Macy. At these stores, I found suitable female clothing – long skirt that narrows at the knees and long sleeve blouses. Wearing these clothes, I felt what it was like to be a female in a Muslim world and wondered at the strength it must take to find your voice when your culture forbids you from being seen or moving freely. What courage it must take to speak out! David also found a shirt. Thank goodness for the Toastmaster Marketplace that opened on Wednesday. We will be sporting new Toastmaster polo shirts at our meetings.

On Thursday evening the semi-final contests were held. Sudharshan Anandan placed third in his semi-final. I felt tremendous pride in Sudharshan and his home club, Area 14, Division E and District 8 team that supported him. Our keynote speakers inspired me to take the stairs, to leave a legacy by influencing others and to set my personal goals higher. Meanwhile, our bags arrived on Friday morning. I wanted to wear everything I brought.

On Saturday morning, at the World Championship of Speaking, I laughed and enjoyed these most humorous speeches that reminded me a mentor that "sees something ..." The Annual Business Meeting followed and we elected our new leaders. That night, we partied with people from around the world. Hanging from the huge ballroom walls were big screens blaring the music of the 60's, 70's and 80's while playing videos from Beatles, Aerosmith, Guns and Roses and Journey, to name a few. It was surreal watching a sea of people lip-sync and line dance to "Achy-Breaky Heart". While (Continued on page 9)

This public praise for the personal value of Toastmasters was made to the 50 members, alumnae and guests present at the October 4, 2014 70th Anniversary of Midtown Clayton Toastmasters Club 283 held in the banquet room at Balaban's in Chesterfield.

The club was chartered as Midtown Toastmasters

Club in October, 1944 at a location in what was the epicenter of "THE IN PLACE TO BE" in St. Louis at the time--the corner of Lindell and Grand. About two dozen nearby businessmen walked to their lunch-time club in the

now shuttered Melbourne Hotel one block south of the Fox Theatre.

"From 1944 until 2014 this club has had a dozen different meeting venues migrating west towards St. Louis County into

Clayton. In 1998, the club's name was changed to Midtown Clayton Club. Thru the years the meeting time has also changed from lunch time to breakfast time and continues with a 7:15 a.m. start time the first and third Fridays of the month.



Midtown Clayton Toastmasters Club is the second largest community club in the St. Louis area with 31 members. There is an Open House for guests at every meeting. The U-shaped table and chair room set up is a tangible embodiment of this club's core value: a safe harbor to practice public speaking and leadership for use in the real world. The Toastmasters culture is alive and very well in this club: experiential learning, self-paced learning, peer feedback and mentoring.

"At this time of remembrance with a club anniversary, we need to also keep in mind the future for both our and your continued personal improvement. Related to tenure in Toastmasters and its legacy in our lives, the next time semi-annual club dues are payable 1) Remit the money promptly 2) Remember what Helen Blanchard, DTM and Past International Director, has said: "If you get out of Toastmasters all there is to get out of Toastmasters, you will never get out of Toastmasters." #



Campus Celebrates Constitution Day by Rachel Webb

University of Missouri-St. Louis students, staff and faculty showed their patriotic stripes Wednesday during the university's annual Constitution Day celebration.

Constitution Day is an observance led by the American Democracy Project. The celebration is a chance for the UMSL community to reflect on the Constitution's authors' purpose and idealism, said Deborah Burris, director of UMSL's Office for Equal Opportunity and chief diversity officer.

Whether the authors realized it or not, they created a document that was timeless, that was unlimited in its definition,"

Burris said during her opening remarks in the main program at the Millennium Student Center. "This is especially critical when we look at the issues faces by our community today, Ferguson and beyond."

The event in the Nosh also featured a reading of the Constitution's preamble by student Amy Cabanas and an introduction by Chancellor Tom George. The centerpiece of the afternoon's events was a competition from Triton Toastmasters, a public-speaking organization. The event featured prepared speeches by Marquetta Anderson, front office and corporate accounts assistant at St. Louis Public Radio, and Ron Gossen, senior associate vice chancellor for University Marketing and Communications, and the extemporaneous Table Topics category. In Anderson's winning speech, she focused on the first three words of the preamble, "We the People."

"We are the people," Anderson said. "We are the people that make decisions. We are the people that empower others."

Gossen focused on the Constitution and its guarantees of free expression.

"As we address injustice, be ever mindful that justice isn't free, that justice doesn't come cheaply, but rather, extracts a commitment to rule of law and the constructs of a civil society," Gossen said.

Other events included a screening and discussion of the documentary "Restrepo," a lecture on American military power and paintings by UMSL students. #

To serve as District Director, you must have served at least six consecutive months as a club president and at least 12 consecutive months as a lieutenant governor or division governor, or a combination of the two at the time you take office.

Program Quality Director (Lieutenant Governor Education & Training)

As the Program Quality Director, you are responsible for all aspects of education and training within the district. This includes supporting quality programming efforts, promoting the Distinguished Club Program, and planning and executing the district conference. Together with your district leadership team, you participate in district leader training sessions at the International Convention, Mid-Year Training, and online training via the Toastmasters Learning Connection.

To be Program Quality Director, you must have served at least six consecutive months as a club president and at least 12 consecutive months as a lieutenant governor, division governor, or area governor. Once you serve as Program Quality Director for a full year, you may not be re-elected to the same office for a succeeding term.

Club Growth Director (Lieutenant Governor Marketing)

As Club Growth Director, you are responsible for all aspects of marketing, club-building, and member-and club-retention efforts within the district. This includes defining an overall marketing strategy for the district, developing outreach and retention efforts with existing community and corporate clubs, and penetrating new markets. Together with your district leadership team, you participate in district leader training sessions at the International Convention, Mid-Year Training, and online training via the Toastmasters Learning Connection.

To be Club Growth Director, you must have served at least six consecutive months as a club president and at least 12 consecutive months as a lieutenant governor, division governor, or area governor. Once you serve as Club Growth Director for a full year, you may not be re-elected to the same office for a succeeding term.

Division Director (Division Governor)

As Division Director, your job is to lead and support the division through the supervision and support of the **Area Directors** (Area Governors). One of your primary goals as Division Director is to ensure that each club achieves its mission and fulfills its responsibilities to its members. To achieve this, you coordinate division activities, set division goals, and assist in the training of area and club leaders.

To serve as Division Director, you must have served at least six consecutive months as a member of a district council. The division director may be re-elected to one succeeding term.

All leadership positions will be posted on the district website including appointed positions of Area Director, Public Relations Manager, Administration Manager, and Finance Manager.

Ponder this quote from Ronald Reagan while considering a leadership position.


