


The new club member has an obvious accent when talking. This new club member often arranges words in a sentence when talking that are unlike English grammar as you know it. This new club member may not tell you but this new club member probably joined Toastmasters to learn to speak English better as well overcome the fear of public speaking. Here's a member in your club who needs a mentor!

Toastmasters club mentors, however, are not trained in linguistics to deal with such a learning need. Even though English is the official language of Toastmasters, International membership in the organization is not a course in English as a Second Language experience where you learn to speak, read, AND write English better. At this time, there are no Toastmasters manuals that can be ordered to guide the mentor in helping this protege member to speak better English.

Well, then, what do you do as a Toastmaster who chooses the role of mentor to an English Language Learner? (aka ELL) You can use 12 strategies to speak better English based on the Toastmasters Promise and linguistic principles which have been assembled as a High 2019-2020 Performance Leadership Project in District 8.

Can You Delegate?

Have you recently taken over a leadership role and found it difficult to ask team members to complete tasks? You don't want to seem too bossy and you worry you are burdening busy people with extra work. You end up doing everything yourself because you feel personally responsible, or because it feels easier that way.


The truth is, delegating tasks to others is one of the best things you can do as a leader. It's actually selfish not to share the workload. When members feel they are making a solid contribution to a club, they are more likely to stay actively engaged.

Can you delegate? Here are five questions to ask yourself:

Do you know what members' talents and passions are? Everyone is good at something. Find out what that something is and use it. If a member suggests an improvement, ask that person to lead the effort. Why? Because if it was their

idea, they are already invested in the outcome. It is for he who cares to do the job. If you are struggling to organize information about your club, ask a member who likes to work with spreadsheets to assist you. He or she will love you for it!

- 2. Do you assign individuals to action items? During an executive committee meeting, officers agree it would be a great idea to reach out to the local community college to publicize Toastmasters. Although all agree, it never happens. Everyone hopes that someone will do it, yet "someone" usually ends up being "no one". It is up to the President of the club to ask a specific officer, usually the VPM or VPPR to complete this task. Casting a broad net for volunteers seldom works. It's more effective to reel in an individual by demonstrating your faith in them.
 - Many of us have worked for someone who rambles on and on, explaining more than necessary. We don't want to be rude, yet we feel like shouting "Just tell me what you want!" People don't mind expectations as long as they are clear and doable. Nor is it bossy to give a due date. Having a due date reduces stress and helps us to manage our time.
- Do you provide equal opportunities for growth? Do you have a member who has been covering



the same task for years? If you worry the person will be offended by passing the job to someone else, explain it will be for their fellow member's benefit to learn the job.

5. Can you accept and appreciate the effort even if it wasn't done the way you would have done it?

I learned this the hard way after my daughter said she didn't want to load the dishwasher because I always re-loaded it. If you assign a task and it was done sufficiently well, find something to praise about it and let the rest go. It builds the person's confidence as well as enthusiasm for doing more.


Yes, you can delegate! As Ronald Reagan said, "The greatest leader is not necessarily the one who does the greatest things. He is the one that gets the people to do the greatest things." Successful delegation gives your members the opportunity to shine which in turn makes your entire club successful.

What Abraham Lincoln Can Teach Us About Storytelling In Our Speeches

Time magazine lists Abraham Lincoln's Gettysburg Address as one of the 10 greatest speeches of all time. One thing that made it so great, was that Lincoln's oration followed one of the most effective story structures you can use, the structure that storytelling expert Shawn Callahan calls "the clarity story" in his book "Putting Stories to Work". This is a book I feel every Toastmaster should read, and can benefit from.

This type of story is so valuable because for people to be engaged, they need to understand why they should take action. As Callahan says, "The clarity story provides reasons in the most powerful and digestible format possible."

Here's how Lincoln used the clarity story structure to build his famous speech:

Part 1 begins with a look back at the past to take the listener back to the way things used to be.

Four score and seven years ago our fathers brought forth on this continent, a new nation, conceived in Liberty, and dedicated to the proposition that all men are created equal.

Part 2 shifts to something that happened: the events that caused a problem or opportunity.

Now we are engaged in a great civil war, testing whether that nation, or any nation so conceived and so dedicated, can long endure. We are met on a great battle-field of that war. We have come to dedicate a portion of that field, as a final resting place for those who here gave their lives that that nation might live. It is altogether fitting and proper that we should do this.

Part 3 is what Callahan calls "so now . . ." which describes the decision or action needed to respond.

But, in a larger sense, we can not dedicate — we can not consecrate — we can not hallow — this ground. The brave men, living and dead, who struggled here, have consecrated it, far above our poor power to add or detract. The world will little note, nor long remember what we say here, but it can never forget what they did here.


Part 4 looks ahead to the future to envision a desired outcome.

It is for us the living, rather, to be dedicated here to the unfinished work which they who fought here have thus far so nobly advanced. It is rather for

us to be here dedicated to the great task remaining before us — that from these honored dead we take increased devotion to that cause for which they gave the last full measure of devotion — that we here highly resolve that these dead shall not have died in vain — that this nation, under God, shall have a new birth of freedom — and that government of the people, by the people, for the people, shall not perish from the earth.

The structure works so well, because it creates a series of events that cause people to want to know what happens next. As Callahan writes, "You need to spark people's interest by starting with the context, then hold their attention because something happens that causes a change, then end with an outcome."

Lincoln relied on this technique in his iconic speech—and you can, too!


