FUNCTIONARIES WHO TYPICALLY SPEAK AT A TOASTMASTERS SPEECH CONTEST AND THEIR RESPONSIBILITIES DURING THE CONTEST

Speaking Functionaries

- 1. Contest Chair
 - When They Speak:
 - Opening and closing remarks.
 - Introducing the Contest Toastmaster.
 - Role in Speaking:
 - Welcomes attendees and provides an overview of the contest agenda.
 - Announces any special acknowledgments or contest-specific notes.

2. Contest Toastmaster (Master of Ceremonies)

- When They Speak:
 - Throughout the contest, managing transitions and introductions.
- Role in Speaking:
 - Introduces each contestant (using only the contestant's name and speech title).
 - Maintains the flow of the event.
 - Provides brief remarks during pauses (e.g., ballot collection).

3. Chief Judge

- When They Speak:
 - During the contestants' briefing (not public).
 - Announcing the contest results to the Contest Chair (optional, if not written).
- Role in Speaking:
 - Ensures contestants and judges understand the rules (private briefing).

4. Sergeant at Arms (SAA)

- When They Speak:
 - At the start of the contest.
- Role in Speaking:
 - Calls the meeting to order.
 - Delivers logistical announcements, such as safety instructions and location details.
- 5. Test Speaker (Evaluation Contests only)
 - When They Speak:
 - Delivers the target speech for evaluation contestants.
 - Role in Speaking:
 - Provides a prepared speech for evaluation contestants to critique.
 - Role in Speaking:
 - Explains their speech's relevance (if required).

Functionaries Who Do Not Speak Publicly

• Voting Judges: Evaluate contestants silently and anonymously.

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- Timers: Signal contestants without speaking.
- Ballot Counters: Operate behind the scenes to tally votes.
